TEXT A

The education system is already very demanding and, outside of the curriculum, there isn't enough time in the day to teach everything that's needed. As a result, life skills from financial education to writing a CV often get missed. With some polls showing that two-thirds of people believe the education system fails to teach kids the right skills, here are some things to teach your kids so they don't miss out on essential knowledge.

Budgeting. Kids need to learn how to budget as it's a core life skill that shows them how to manage their money effectively. This in turn can help them avoid debt and save for their future goals. It also teaches them about the importance of making wise² financial decisions. By learning how to track³ their incoming and outgoing money, and set weekly limits on their expenses, they'll be able to make choices that are good for their financial future.

The basics of personal finance. Personal finance is the process of managing your money to meet your financial goals. It includes budgeting, saving, investing, and managing debt. Managing money effectively demands a sophisticated set of skills ranging from basic mathematical skills to budgeting, an understanding of how interest works, or emotional regulation to avoid splurging⁴.

Cooking. Cooking is taught to some extent in years 7 to 9⁵, but to give your child more extensive cooking skills, involve them in making everyday meals. As they get older, empower them to make their breakfast and lunch and cook alongside you for evening meals.

DIY. DIY skills can teach kids important life skills, such as problem-solving, creativity, and patience. These skills can also help them save money by allowing them to fix things around the house themselves, rather than hiring someone else. They can start practicing with with simple things, such as changing light bulbs, fixing a broken toy, or painting walls.

Environmental awareness. While there are modules on environmental issues within Geography or Science at school, it's not always in-depth. According to UNESCO, there are three reasons to provide children with a strong ecological education: (i) to make them more aware and conscious of environmental problems; (ii) to boost their interest in caring for and improving the environment, and (iii) to enhance their ability to learn about their surroundings.

TEXT B

Our current food system is unsustainable. Raising and slaughtering¹ around 70 billion farmed animals each year comes at a cost that is too high for animals, workers, and the planet to bear². With our population expected to reach nearly 10 billion people by 2050, it's important that we ask ourselves: What does a more sustainable way of feeding the world look like? What will we eat and how will we grow our food? The future of food is happening right before our eyes.

So, what is the future of food?

3D Printed. This may not sound real, but just as we have created objects using 3D printing, 3D-printed food is already in the works. It is made through a process called additive manufacturing, in which an edible³ paste is added layer by layer to create foods. Redefine Meat, a startup⁴ that produces 3D-printed steaks it believes are more sustainable than beef from cows, says that 3D printing is the key to "animal-free meat with the appearance, texture, and flavor of whole muscle meat." The company has raised \$29 million in funding towards a commercial launch⁵, and Insider has reported that "it could revolutionize the meat industry." 3D printing is also a focus of research at the NASA, as a possible way to produce food for long missions to space.

Algae. Algae is preferred by many for its essential amino acids, vitamins, and minerals and as a potential source of sustainable food that is currently underutilized. Algae can be cultivated without using land or a large amount of natural resources. The food outlet *Food Dive* reports that "algae are literally everywhere. These single-celled organisms grow in freshwater, saltwater, and wastewater. Algae can grow and flourish in the sun through photosynthesis, but it can also grow in the dark. And it can be cultivated without using land or a large amount of natural resources."

Edible Food Packaging. By selling food in edible packaging, we could reduce both food waste and pollution, an urgent problem. A 2017 report stated that by 2050, the oceans will contain more plastic than fish. The nonprofit organization Food Tank reports that "to combat the harmful environmental effects of plastic, many companies are seeking to replace excess plastic packaging with edible materials. Using innovative technology and plant-based materials like seaweed, organizations have developed numerous packaging alternatives safe for human consumption."
